Forming the pride

In this fun game, you will pretend to be lions in a pride! Each of you will have an important job as you work together to catch the prey. This game will show how teamwork makes the pride strong.

What you need

- + Ribbons or rope to be tall grass
- + Small cones, hoops, or other objects for obstacles

ACTIVITY TIME 40 Mins

MINIMUM PLAYERS 6+

How to play

- 1. 2 or more players are chosen as drivers, 2 or more as ambushers, 1 or 2 as cubs and 1 player pretends to be prey. In larger groups have 2 or 3 players as prey.
- 2. Create your savannah using ribbon and rope to create areas for drivers to hide in.
- 3. Use cones, hoops and other objects to create obstacles for ambushers to hide behind.
- 4. The aim of the game is for the prey to run from one end of the savannah to the other without getting caught. Drivers and ambushers work together as a team to catch their prey.

"Every lion in the pride is important. If one role doesn't do its job, the hunt won't work. That's why we're going to practice working as a team and taking it in turns to be drivers, ambushers, cubs or prey"



Drivers

Chase something and guide it towards the ambushers.

Ambushers

Hide behind an object or crouch low ready to pounce.

Cubs

Stand still and watch the group hunt.

Prey

Running and zigzagging to escape the ambushers.

Lions live on the savannah, a big, open grassland with very few trees.


> Each lion in the pride has a job during the hunt, and they can catch animals much bigger than themselves when they work as a team!

The tall grass helps lions hide when they are hunting, making it easier for them to sneak up on their prey.

Roar like a lion



Loud roar

A deep, rumbling roar that travels up to 5 miles. Used as a warning.

The Lion Calls

COMPARISON:

Like the sound of a big thunderstorm or a very loud drum!

PURPOSE:

This roar tells other animals to sta away or warns of danger.

Friendly roar

A quieter, low-pitched roar that is less intense.

COMPARISON:

Like a parent calling softly to a child from another room or a low hum.

PURPOSE:

This roar is used to call a nearby pride.

Cubs mini roars

Small growls and squeaky roars from young lions learning to talk.

COMPARISON:

Like a puppy barking or a baby giggling loudly.

PURPOSE:

Cubs practice roaring to copy adults and explore their voices.

Pride roar

Multiple lions roaring together to show strength.

COMPARISON:

Like a sports team cheering together loudly or a group singing a loud song.

PURPOSE:

This roar helps the pride stay connected and mark their territory.

Content purring or chuffing

A soft sound lions make when they are relaxed.

COMPARISON:

Like a cat purring or the sound of someone humming a tune.

PURPOSE:

Used to say hello to other lions

Cubs practice their roars by growling and squeaking when they are young, learning from the adults in their pride. In this activity you will practice the different type of lion roars. Let's see how loud your lion roar can be! We'll measure it using a special sound meter and find out who can roar the loudest!

What you need

- + A designated roaring zone where you can practice your roars
- + A smartphone or tablet with a free decibel meter app installed (or a sound level meter), if available

30 Mins

A lion's roar is so loud it can reach up to 114 decibels—almost as loud as a rock concert!

Design a lion habitat

ACTIVITY TIME 50 Mins

You will learn about where lions live and what they need to survive by creating a habitat for them. This activity will help you understand how lions live in the wild and why their home is so important.

What you need

- + Coloured paper, craft paper, or card stock
- + Markers, crayons, or coloured pencils
- + Cotton balls (for clouds), tissue paper (for grass or water), and craft lolly sticks (for trees)
- + Small toy animals or paper cutouts (like lions, zebras, and giraffes)
- + A big piece of cardboard, shoebox or thick paper to build your habitat on/in

Food challenge

What challenges do lions face?

Lions live in the savannah, and it's not always easy to survive there! They have to deal with many challenges, just like we do when things don't go as planned. Here are some examples:



But these animals don't stay in one



Weather

The savannah can be very hot, but find shade to stay cool during the heat or places to stay dry during big storms.



New dangers

Sometimes, lions have to protect their even other lions trying to take over their



Lions are really good at

Obstacle savannah

Let's pretend to be lions living in the savannah! You'll go through an obstacle course that changes as you play. This will help you learn how lions adapt to challenges in the wild.

What you need

- + A space to set up the obstacle course (indoors or outdoors)
- + Fun items for obstacles; Hula hoops, cones or chairs, ribbons or ropes, and a soft toy or beanbag to act as your prey
- + A timer or stopwatch



How to play

SET UP OBSTACLES

- 1. Make a starting line and place a prey zone at the end.
- 2. Add fun sections to your course.
- Tall Grass: Use streamers or ropes to weave through, like a lion would in tall grass
- Water Holes: Lay hula hoops for hopping across
- Rocks: Place cones or chairs to crawl under or climb around

Walk through the course and explain how to move through each obstacle, like hopping, crawling, or weaving.

RUN THE COURSE

Take turns roaring like lions and going through the obstacle course. Cheer each other on and see who can reach the prey at the end!

CHANGE THE COURSE

After each round, change the course to make it harder or different:

- Add fallen trees (chairs to move around)
- Move obstacles around for a new path
- Explain that lions face challenges like moving prey, new dangers, or sudden weather changes

Why do lions need to adapt?

Lions are really clever and can change what they do to survive. Here's how:

Hunting

Lions use tall grass to hide and sneak up on prey or run fast in open spaces.

Resting

Lions relax in the shade during the hot day to save their energy.

Teamwork

Lions help each other in their pride to solve problems, like catching big animals or protecting cubs.



How lions move





Walking

Lions walk on all four legs, using their strong, padded paws to move quietly through the grass. This helps them sneak up on their prey without being heard.



Jumping

Lions are excellent jumpers. They can leap around 6ft in the air, meaning they could jump over most humans.



using their tails

Lions use their long tails for balance, especially when they're running or turning quickly. Their tails also help them communicate with other lions.



Running

Lions can run very fast when they need to catch prey, reaching speeds of up to 50 miles per hour! However, they can only run fast for short distances because it uses a lot of energy.



Crouching

When lions hunt, they crouch low to the ground to hide in the tall grass. This makes it harder for their prey to see them.



Stretching and resting

Lions spend a lot of time stretching and resting. They can sleep up to 20 hours a day to save energy for hunting and other activities.



Talking with their tails

Lions live in prides and need to work together, especially when hunting or protecting their group. Tail movements are like secret signals that help lions silently share their feelings or intentions without making noise. This is especially useful during a hunt when staying quiet is essential.



When a lion flicks its tail back and forth, it might be feeling annoved or impatient. This could happen if another lion is bothering it or when it's waiting for the right moment to hunt.

Tail held high

When a lion's tail is up in the air, it can mean it's being friendly. It might be saying hello to another lion or feeling confident and happy.

Tail held Low

A lion's tail pointing down might mean it's feeling careful or nervous, especially around stronger lions in the pride.

Slowly swinging tail

A slowly moving tail shows the lion is calm and relaxed. You might see this when it's lying down or resting with its pride.

Fast moving tail

A tail moving quickly might mean the lion is upset or ready to act, like when it's protecting its pride or spotting danger.



Cardboard

You will make your own cardboard lion with parts that can move. This fun activity will help you learn how lions move and how simple tools like hinges and fasteners work.

What you need

- + Printer
- + Lion template. Download your lion template here
- + Scissors (use safety scissors)
- + Brass fasteners (split pins)
- + Markers, crayons, or coloured pencils
- + Glue or tape

Can you make your lion walk across the savannah? Move its legs one at a time like it's on the hunt.

Explore a lion's paw!

Let's learn about how big a lion's paw is and how lions use their paws to survive in the wild. We'll compare a lion's paw to our hands and make some fun paw prints!

What you need

- + Paper and pencils for tracing and drawing
- + Rulers to measure
- + Optional: play dough or modelling clay to make paw imprints

What to do

- 1. Use a pencil to trace your hand on a piece of paper. Place the lion paw picture next to your hand tracing. Which is bigger?
- 2. Use a ruler to measure the width and length of both.



The average size of the front paw is 13-15 cm long and 11-13 cm wide

How are your hands similar & different to a lions paw

Similarities

Both have pads

Just like lions have soft pads on their paws, we have soft skin on our palms.

Both can grab or hold

Lions use their claws to grab prey, and we use our fingers to grab things.

Both help us move

Lions use their paws to walk and run, just like we use our hands to crawl or climb.

Differences

Claws vs. nails

Lions have sharp claws that come out when they need them. We have flat nails that don't scratch like theirs.

Size

A lion's paw is MUCH bigger than our hands—about as wide as a dinner plate!

Number of toes

Lions have 4 toes and a dewclaw on each front paw, while we have 4 fingers & 1 thumb on each hand.

Walking style

Lions walk on their toes, like they're tiptoeing all the time. We primarily use a heel-to-toe motion.

Paw pads

Lions have rough paw pads to grip the ground when they run. Our hands are smoother and not for running.





Story based earning

Lions are amazing animals that work together to stay safe, find food and take care of each other. Just like a team, each lion has an important job to do!

In The Lion Pride's Big Adventure, you'll see how the lions use teamwork, bravery and quick thinking to solve a big problem. As you read, thinking about how the lions help each other and why working together makes them stronger.





Glossary



Adapt

To change and adjust to new situations, like lions hunting in different weather or places.

Asiatic Lion

A rare type of lion that lives in a forest in India.



Balance

How lions stay steady when running or climbing, often helped by their tails.

Boundary

The edge of a pride's territory, which lions protect from other animals.



Camouflage

How lions blend into their surroundings, like the tall grass, to sneak up on prey.

Carnivore

An animal, like a lion, that eats meat.

Claws

Sharp nails on a lion's paws used for catching prey.

Cub

A baby lion. Cubs stay with their pride to learn how to hunt and roar.

Drought

A long time with no rain. Lions have to find water during a drought.

Ecosystem

The environment where lions live, which includes plants, other animals, and water.

How lions act when they're defending their pride or territory.

The soft hair that covers a lion's body, keeping it warm and protected.

A low sound lions make to warn others or communicate within their pride.

Habitat

The place where lions live, like the savannah or forests.

Hierarchy

The order of importance in a pride, with the strongest lions leading.

Hunter

Lions who catch prey for the pride.


King of the jungle

A nickname for lions because they are strong and powerful (even though they live in the savannah, not jungles!).

Lion pride

A family of lions that live and work together.

Loud Roar



The thick hair around a male lion's head. It makes him look bigger and protects him in fights.

Nocturnal

Lions are active mostly at night, which helps them avoid the heat of the day.

The soft feet of lions that have sharp claws for catching prey.

Pounce

A quick jump lions make to catch their prey.

Prey

Animals that lions hunt and eat, like zebras and antelopes.

Protectors

Lions that keep the pride safe from danger.

The loud sound lions make to communicate with their pride or scare others away.

Savannah

A large, grassy area in Africa where most lions live.

Stalk
